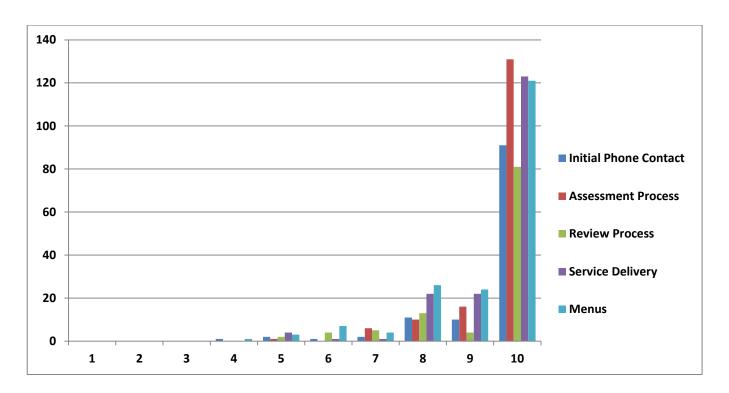

Client Survey 2017

The clients were asked to score our service through a variety of questions across five main areas.

There were 25 questions, divided into five areas, with 43 households responding to most questions, scoring each question out of 10, 1 being least satisfied, 10 being most satisfied.



The results were mostly positive and we are taking on board some issues raised re our menus. We did expect some fall out with the transition to My Aged Care. The few negative comments received were followed up by staff.

Some of the comments received:

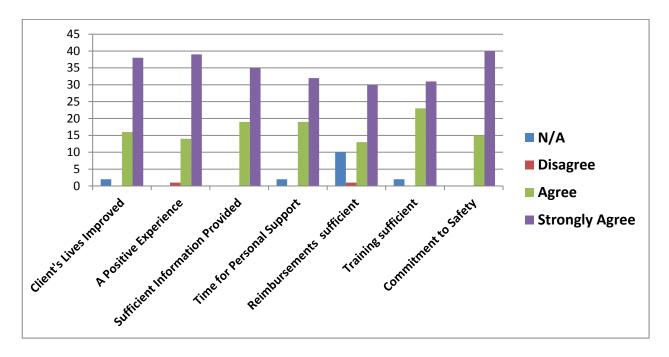
- All the people cheer me up

Volunteer Survey 2017

The volunteers were asked to score our service through a variety of questions We received 60 replies, with the majority of questions answered.



The majority of responses were very positive, with volunteers overall happy with our service and the role they play. From this it was evident that some areas need work:

Recognition of our Commitment to Safety – 90% aim that volunteers Strongly Agree Training is sufficient - quite a few volunteers requested more training or suggested meetings for discussion/review of practices would be a good idea Reimbursements – it is not possible to increase the fuel reimbursement at this stage due to budget constraints

President's and Manager's Message

This year we are celebrating 60 years since the delivery of the first meal from Town Hall in Sydney. Right from the start and equally now, MoW meals are intended to mimic 'home cooked', providing a significant nutritional contribution, as well as offering some vital social contact to



those who are isolated. Currently there are around 35,000 volunteers across our state without whom Meals on Wheels could not function.

There is great uncertainty about funding arrangements for our services past 2020. Australian Meals on Wheels and NSW Meals on Wheels have been lobbying the Commonwealth Government strongly on our behalf and the following are some of the key points being raised:

- MoW should be viewed as a preventative health service, where food and social connection is medicine
- Outcomes achieved by MoW will not be achieved by private suppliers
- Communities thrive when volunteering is strong, and this won't happen if for-profit organisations enter the sector
- Direct, or block funding is the appropriate mechanism for government support of meal services
- Competition, including tendering out of services, creates risk for the future viability of MoW services
- Consumer directed care, with consumers holding funds rather than providers, creates cash flow and solvency risks for many MoW services

Preventative Care Model

The preventative Care Model adopted by Food Services aims to assist people, in the long or short term, who are frail, recovering from an illness or have a disability, as well as carers who assist them. It aims to minimise the frequency and length of hospitalisations of older people.

The following figures from the UK highlight the direction we could be heading:

"after cost cutting from government, there has been a dramatic decline in the number of people receiving meals from 75,885 in 2011 to 29,605 in 2014. During the same period there was a 34.2% increase in hospital admissions due to malnutrition."

The benefits of volunteering in communities is well researched and validatedvolunteers are a symptom of what might be regarded as an important indicator of a healthy society. They undertake some very important functions within any community, apart from the specific work that they undertake, generating social capital. We know that where social capital is high, interpersonal violence, criminality, drug taking, mental and physical illness and suicide have a much lower incidence and cost those communities vastly less than where social capital has declined or disappeared. It should be noted that volunteers involved in Food Services are very much locally based and embedded in their local communities, which ensures that the experiences of clients and the service is enhanced by a strong connectedness with the local community. Block funding enables the flexibility of the Preventative Care Model to build on these social connections. (from NSWMoW's submission to Productivity Commission 2016)

Having said this, we need to emphasise two things:-

- 1. Nothing has been decided yet by Government, all that we are doing is asking serious questions and putting our point forward.
- 2. Meals on Wheels has been around for over 60 years in Australia and will likely be around for a long time yet, and it is important that we remain positive.

My Aged Care

My Aged Care is now the one point of entry for aged care. Fortunately, and largely due to the successful lobbying of NSWMoW, we can commence clients immediately who require meals, and then assist them to register with MAC. Originally this was not the case and caused some serious delays initially for urgent needs. You will be pleased to know that not one client of ours had to wait for their meal service – we did the deed and then argued the case!

Flexible Food Program

The Social Support program is going from strength to strength. Certainly being of mature years does not limit the desire to learn new things. Trips to the Barramundi Farm in Nelson Bay and the Macadamia Farm at Medowie were very popular, with lots of questions asked during the tours. We now have a group of seniors well versed in the art of raising fish and nuts for the table! Movies are very popular, High Teas very elegant and fun and the Nelson Bay Dolphin Watching cruise was a huge success, the local dolphin pod put on a great display. Sue, in her earnest desire to ensure her charges enjoy themselves, injured herself quite badly late last year and spent some time in hospital and recovering at home. This created a hiatus in the Flexible Food Program and permission was gained from the Department of Health to reduce the required outputs.

Sue and the Manager had fun earning a grant through the Awesome Foundation. We had to sing for our supper – or tout in this case. We were awarded \$1317 raised on the night towards bus hire and fuel for Flexible Food. Quite a different way of applying for a grant, and rather nerve wracking for them at the time, but never let it be said that either of the two ladies are ever at a loss for words!

Meal Program and Kitchens

This year we have recorded a record number of outputs – meals delivered – and a record number of clients utilising our service. At no time did we say we are full and you need to go on a waiting list. However it must be noted that we are reaching limits in meal storage, in particular at Toronto Kitchen, and this will need to be addressed sooner rather than later. When both kitchens were built many years ago, storage of frozen meals was not required nor factored in. The Board of Management is in the process of having an extension to the Toronto Kitchen designed, to incorporate a freezer room and coolroom, with better workflows in the kitchen and office. Once costed out, we can begin to look at funding sources.

Toronto Kitchen is also on the list with the Cityserve volunteers (through LMCC) for external painting and hopefully this will be undertaken sometime in October.

Toronto Kitchen had a new telephone system installed via funding from the Clubs Grant 2016 that will be compatible with the NBN when it rolls out. It is a mini PABX that has two line capability with the possibility of adding extensions as we expand.

We now lease 3 Thorne St as our carpark and during 2017-2018 LMCC will be upgrading the car park for us - tar sealing at last and hopefully extended into the swampy end. We have asked that a front fence and gate be included so we can better control access and parking.

The Community Builders Grant 2016 has repaired the guttering at Toronto Kitchen and will also cover the cost of a set of steel steps to be installed at the north end of the building. These will be necessary to bring the building up to current safe standards – two exit points from the building.

NDIS

The National Disability Insurance Scheme for under 65's has been an interesting exercise for our service and continues to have its challenges. Communication is one of the biggest issues, and the inability for service providers to easily talk to or find out a client's coordinator of supports. Having a client inform us their support person's name is "Bruce" doesn't really narrow it down! Certainly, more staff hours than was originally thought, is being taken up with navigating this system.

Volunteers

Avondale High School and Toronto High School have provided students for Mother's Day and Father's Day meal runs and feedback from the client's has been wonderful.

These students all volunteer and genuinely appear to enjoy the time they spend with our people. Our service is helping to instil a sense of community in these young people and further enhances our districts' social capital. Thank you to our volunteers who provide escort on the day.

This year we have one dedicated long serving volunteer who we have nominated for the Premier's Award for reaching 25 years volunteering for our service and who will be formally recognised later in the year.

Lady Lioness's have organised gifts for our clients for Mother's Day and Father's Day and Curves Morisset and Toronto have supported our Christmas Giving Tree.

Our corporate sponsors continue their vital support of our service – releasing staff to regularly volunteer as deliverers, and/or providing a cash injection to help cover the cost of our meal containers. Our thanks to Centennial Coal, Origin Energy and South Lake Macquarie RSL.

Marketing and Technology

The Marketing Committee has been meeting regularly and with the purchase of a projector and screen, Board members Jane Smith and Graham Boyd have been doing presentations to various community groups. We have recognised this as an excellent way to get our message out there – we need to remain current in the community and work at advertising our presence. Many know our service exists, but do not realise what we do – "more than just a meal" – and how to contact us, particularly with My Aged Care.

Carol and Peter Gambrill organised most of the prizes at our annual Christmas raffle, which involved much leg work personally approaching local businesses. We encourage everyone who wins a prize to visit the business and thank them, ensuring perhaps some repeat support.

Our Facebook Page is proving popular and we endeavour to post something each week. Certainly our corporate sponsors appreciate any 'shout out' we can give them however we do like to recognise our everyday, but no less important, volunteers as well. So we thank you for your forbearance when the dreaded camera appears. Social Media is here to stay and ensuring we are responsible and regular with our posting is important. We recommend all volunteers 'friend' our page as it is a good way of staying informed.

At long last we have a web page and we are gaining quite a few clients through this – mainly from family members looking us up. It is a great way for our menus to reach the public and we are determined to become more proactive about having a news page as well. Google us and have a look.

Our service is in the process of moving into the "Cloud". Our data will be stored off site in secure servers, and if ever we have a major power outage or shut down of our kitchens, it will as simple as hooking up a lap top to be able to continue the service. This is a major undertaking for the service and will include considerable upskilling by staff to understand the new system. Already our emails are cloud based and hopefully our word processing system is next.

Via one of our newest Board Members, Garth Weiley, Event Cinemas have really supported us this year. Recently Kotara, Newcastle and Glendale Cinemas have been running a 30 second advertisement – you may remember the Meals on Wheels ad with Archie the dog – up to 40 times a day – all free of charge! Whilst a generic MoW ad, the exposure has been amazing and we are already receiving feedback.

The most important aspect of our service is its people. We would like to acknowledge all our volunteers for their exceptional work. Whatever role you undertake in our service to help support the more vulnerable in our community, please accept our sincere thanks. We would also like to acknowledge the organisation's staff, a dedicated and strong team committed to navigating the sector's continuing challenges. Thank you for your continued focus on providing a first rate service to our clients and volunteers.

Finally thanks to the Board of Management for their dedication to ensuring our service's governance and direction is maintained at the highest level.
